CHROMEBOOKS & BYOD

On 21 February all Melrose High School students who opted into the Education Directorate Chromebook initiative received their new device, the ACER Chromebook Spin 11. The rollout was a huge success, with the majority of families opting into this program. As per our BYOD policy, all students are required to bring their own device to school every day.

The ACER Chromebook Spin 11 has military grade durability, a tamper-proof and spill resistant keyboard and an extra tough glass cover. The 360° hinge gives students four usage modes, and the flexibility to work or play in a wide variety of environments. All students need to ensure that their devices are fully charged when they come to school each morning, as they will be using them in their classes each day. They also need to have access to their device at home every day to complete their homework and assignments.



If students have any technical issues with their Chromebooks they should report them immediately to our IT Officer or Ms Aine McAuley. CHROMEBOOK FAQ'S

Who owns the device?

Under this initiative the ACT Government owns the device, but secondary students are responsible for the upkeep of the device once it is allocated to them. It is allocated to them to use for learning, in and outside of school.

What is the expectation for usage?

It is common for students to bring devices into school to support their learning and our approach to device usage has always been balanced and focused on educational best practice and alignment to the Australian Curriculum. Not all learning requires a device and there are many existing programs and opportunities in schools that will always be on offer to provide students a rich learning experience.

Can anyone use a device allocated to a student?

The devices issued to secondary students under this program will be configured to only allow Canberra public school students to log into and use them. This is not just to deter theft, but to ensure the devices are tailored best for our students.

What if the device gets damaged, stolen, lost or needs repairing?

One device Chromebook will be offered to each participating student only. It is the responsibility of the student to look after the Chromebook. Lost, damaged or stolen Chromebook must be reported to the school as soon as possible and the school may ask for evidence about what happened, such as a statutory declaration or police report.

What happens if my child goes to school without the device?

Students are expected to bring the Chromebook to school every day, fully charged. Schools have a bank of spare devices for student use and can make arrangements to provide access for students when they don't have access to their Chromebook, however, the numbers of available devices are limited and students should not rely on a spare Chromebook being available.

What about buying software?

There is no cost to parents/guardians for the applications used on the Chromebook and they do not require additional software.

Should the Chromebook be used at home?

Absolutely, students can engage in their learning whenever it suits them, all they need is access to Wi-Fi and they are away. In saying this, it is important to maintain a balanced approach to device use.

What can be done to support balanced, safe and responsible device use at home?

Our schools digital citizenship program, run through roll groups, conversations at home and role modelling desired behaviour all help in teaching responsible and productive computer use. The Office of eSafety Commissioner's website is a great resource to go to get information on supporting young people to have safe and positive experiences online. In particular, the iParent page offers a number of practical strategies to assist parents/guardians to manage internet connected devices at home. These include restricting screen time, preventing access to certain sites and games, and receiving alerts to potentially harmful social media activity. The Young and eSafe page is specifically designed for secondary students and young adults and covers online safety with respect to resilience, critical thinking, responsibility, empathy and respect. We encourage parents to ensure responsible use at home and support school efforts in promoting responsible online behaviour.

What happens to the device once a student finishes or leaves the school?

If a secondary student is leaving the Canberra public school system permanently then the device needs to be returned to the school before they leave. Where a student moves from one Canberra public secondary school to another, the Chromebook will follow the student to the new school.

BIG PICTURE

The Year 9 Big Picture Advisory is group of 24 students who have chosen to learn through the Big Picture design of project-based learning. The students completed a week long intensive Immersion Program in Term 4 last year, as well as an application process to win their place in the academy. The three teachers in the Year 9 program for 2018 are Mrs Humaira Jalil (MATHS/SCIENCE), Ms Tatum O'Meara (ENGLISH/HASS) and Mrs Ali Inskeep (ELECTIVES.).

The first weeks of this year were spent setting up the classroom and the expectations of the course but the students then moved onto completing their first exhibition 'Past, Present, Future.' They have also completed activities such as Story Sticks, Reflective Journals and Learning Styles. These will be included in the upcoming exhibition, as artefacts of their life. The exhibition is a presentation that is shared to an advisor, peers and family members.



Students completed a Learning Plan for this exhibition, breaking the task into the five learning goals; Empirical Reasoning, Quantitative Reasoning, Communication, Social Reasoning and Personal Qualities. Humaira's lesson on Genetics is an example of how the curriculum is part of their learning plan, ensuring that students consider Empirical Reasoning in their learning.

During this week the students presented their first exhibition 'Past, Present, Future.' This is where the students researched their family history and their first years of school. Students then explored where they are at covering aspects of their interests and then making career pathways for the future. Students invited parents and friends to attend and it was an enjoyable experience for all. Thank you to all the parents who attended their child's exhibition and the Melrose High High Tea.

Students are starting to consider places for their internships. This is when the students find a mentor who share the same passion and attend a workplace one day a week. We will be appealing to our wider school community for work placements.



ACE SCIENCE

Science education at Melrose High School continues to grow in size and sophistication. For the last few years, the number of students enrolled in the program has remained at around 30 for each class; in 2018 a record 63 students applied for an original 30 positions in Year 8, with the result that there are now two Year 8 ACE Science classes. These students join the existing 55 students in Years 9 and 10 and will experience a wide range of seminars and tours designed to develop a deep understanding of the nature and diversity of science in our society.

Science Mentors has seen similar growth, expanding by about a third for each of the last three years. In 2018, 40 students have undertaken projects and will be partnered with experienced professionals across a dazzling range of scientific disciplines. Eleven of the projects are being run through MSATT, the astronomical teaching facility at Mount Stromlo Observatory. Students are spread across Years 9 to 12, with six students attending from Canberra College. Projects will be conducted in areas as diverse as deep sky imaging, pathology, physics, mycology, robotics, cosmology and rocketry, just to name a few. Over the next six to nine months, the students will undertake investigations and prepare formal refereed and referenced reports on their findings. The completed projects will be celebrated at a formal event in late November.



The continued expansion of the program has resulted in demand for more supporters from academia, government and industry, and we are grateful for this continued community support. In all, between one and two hundred scientists, engineers and technicians are involved in the ACE Science program for the benefit of the students. BRAVE SELF HELP PROGRAM FOR TEENAGE ANXIETY

Everyone feels anxious or worried every now and then. Teenagers may get anxious about things like tests, meeting new people, being away from their family, speaking in public, competing, dating and in response to peer conflict. These feelings are natural responses to common situations that are usually short-lived. For some young people however, anxiety can be more severe and persistent, to the extent that it interferes with the activities of day-to-day life and causes problems at school and at home.

The BRAVE self help program is one avenue for addressing teen anxiety. It is a free, online program for the prevention and treatment of childhood and adolescent anxiety. It can be accessed at:

The BRAVE program is based on the principles of Cognitive-Behavioural Therapy (CBT), a treatment that has shown to be effective in treating anxiety in young people. It was developed by a team from the University of Queensland, Griffith University and the University of Southern Queensland and in May 2014 was made freely available online in association with beyondblue and UniQuest. The BRAVE program has been very popular with over 14,000 Australians using this program in 2016. Some teenagers prefer to receive support in person, others choose online self-help. Each approach to therapy has its own advantages and benefits. If your child needs further assistance please do not hesitate to contact the Melrose School Psychologist to identify additional resources.
